
A final note: if any of your ticket purchasers who may be after you wanting to know why they didn't win. I witnessed this year's drawing of the winning ticket.

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The Story of St. Patrick

Note:

This is a reprint from an earlier newsletter for the benefit of our recently initiated brothers.

Our saint was born in the late fourth century in Britain, a part of the Roman Empire. His father, Calpornius, was a deacon of the church and a land owner, probably with slaves. His son, was called Patricus, a Latin name meaning "noble of the patrician class." The family was, according to most sources, of Celtic origin and had risen in prestige in the local society.

Patrick was captured by local

Ireland as a slave. He was given the task of watching over a herd of sheep for a local chief. In the depth of his misery he heard a voice calling him. That voice sustained him in all his trials. After a few years of servitude he escaped and made his way back to his home. He was a completely changed individual. He entered religious life and studied in France. Again, he heard the voice telling him to go back to Ireland. His knowledge of the Irish and their culture stood him in good stead as he developed his apostolate in Ireland. Patrick's big breakthrough came when he lighted an Easter fire in honor of the Savior's resur-

raiders and transported to

rection and in so doing he violated the Druids order prohibiting all fires until they offered their ceremony to the pagan gods. Patrick gained the respect, trust and admiration of the Irish and was appointed the first archbishop of all Ireland. He died on March 17th about the year 461AD. Most patron saint's feast days honor the date when they were called into eternity. His origin? Oh yes. Patrick's original (celtic) name was, Maewyn Succat. That sounds Welsh to me. You can draw vour own conclusion. It's ok because the Irish share our one day per year with everybody.

Our Lady of Knock

OUR LADY OF KNOCK

On August 21,1879, Mary McLoughlin, the housekeeper for a small parish church in County Mayo, went to visit a friend. As she walked by the chapel

she noticed a bright light illuminating what looked like three figures that she assumed were new statues that the priest had purchased. After a short visit, Mary and her friend Mary Byrne walked back to the rectory in the rain. As they approached they saw not statues but three actual people whom they identified as the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph and St. John. Our Lady was looking toward heaven with her hands slightly raised. Mary Byrne left her friend there and ran to tell her family. A total of eighteen people ranging from 6 to 70 years old came and witnessed the vision. Mary was in the center wearing white with a large crown on her head. St. Joseph was on her right and St. John was on her left with his hand raised as if giving a blessing. St. John was dressed as a bishop. There was a lamb resting on an altar behind the Blessed Mother and her companions. The apparition lasted for a period of time in a driving rain. After the apparition had ended the ground under the location where the three figures had been, was found to be perfectly dry. The next

day the villagers went to the priest and reported the apparition. Word spread and pilgrims arrived in Knock by the thousands. In 1880, a statue of our Lady of Knock was erected. Many cures have been reported and the church acknowledged the apparition in 1971. In 1976, a new church was dedicated to our Lady of Knock and in 1979, Pope John Paul II made a pilgrimage to Knock. She is also known as Our Lady of Silence.

Slemish mountain

Slemish Mountain, the first known Irish home of St. Patrick is in Co. Antrim. The mountain rises about 1500 feet (437 metres) above the surrounding plain, and it is actually the central core of an extinct volcano. Following his capture and being brought as a slave to Ireland, Patrick worked as a shepherd at Slemish Mountain for about six years, from ages 16 through 22, for a man named Milchu (or Miluic). It was during this time that Patrick turned to frequent prayer as his only consolation in his loneliness. In a vision he was encouraged to escape and return home. He did, became a priest and returned to convert the

Irish. The rest is history. His own real conversion took place while on Slemish out in all weathers communing with nature and praying continuously. Slemish Mountain is open yearround, and on St. Patrick's Day large crowds hike to the top of the mountain as a pilgrimage.
