
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE (CONTINUED)

ST. KEVIN

His life is not well known, as no contemporaneous material exists. His Latin *vita* maintains that he was descended from a royal line and was related to the <u>Dál Messin</u> <u>Corb</u>. He was given the name <u>Coemgen</u>, which means "gentle one", was baptized by <u>Cronan</u>, and educated by <u>St</u> <u>Petroc</u> during that saint's sojourn in Ireland. He lived in

solitude at Disert-Coemgen for seven years, sleeping on a dolmen (now known as "Saint Kevin's Bed") perched on a perilous precipice, that an angel had led him to, and later established a church for his own community at Glendalough. This monastery was to become the parent of several others. Eventually, Glendalough, with its seven

churches, became one of the chief <u>pilgrimage</u> destinations in Ireland. His legend says that he lived to the age of 120.
