<u>Division Sponsored Irish</u> History Presentation

Professor John Countryman gave a very interesting presentation this year on December 1st on "The Royal Sites of Ireland", by way of ZOOM. John covered many tales of mythological Ireland, touching on the individual provinces of Ulster, Leinster, Munster and Connaught. Thanks to Matt Dullaghan for organizing this Division presentation again this year!

A Bit of Irish History

The Burren is one of the wonders of Ireland, A rolling rocky landscape of limestone hills and plains in northwestern County Clare, it is marked with history stretching back thousands of years. Nestled in between the limestone slabs are herbs and plants you'd be hard pressed to find elsewhere, hailing from places as far afield as the Arctic and the Mediterranean, kept warm in the cold wailing winter months by the rock around them. As desolate as it seems - one of Cromwell's men described it as "there is

not a tree to hang a man from, water to drown one in nor dirt to bury one in" - it holds many secrets and mysteries.

There are passage graves beside ring forts alongside abandoned homes and 19th century churches. Ancient caves like Ailwee dot the area, along with dolmens and places rich with folklore. Visitors are well advised to take a look at Kilfenora stone cross and Cathedral, Newtown castle and Poulawick cairn. No journey to the Burren would be complete with-

out a stop by Poulnabroune dolmen - built by the first farmers to come here, almost six thousand years ago - and Gleninsheen or Parknabinna wedge tombs, or the stone fort at Caherdoonerish. Earthen barrows are widespread as are remarkable castles protected by upright stone fortifications.

An example of a ring fort on the Burren is Caherdoonerish, located at the summit of Gleninagh Mountain in the north Burren region of County Clare. Originally constructed on a rock plateau overlooking Galway Bay, there are some astounding elevated views of the Aran Islands, Fanore Beach and Galway Bay. The fort was built sometime between 6th and 9th centuries. Although the Caherdoonerish fort is in

poor condition, many other ring forts still exist in very good condition throughout Ireland, such as the Grianan Aileach fort in Donegal, which

dates back to 3,000 BC. The fort is open to visitors and provides a beautiful view of three counties of Ireland.

Wild cats and goats roam the stands of hazel woodland throughout the Burren, along with red squirrels, foxes and voles, and on a rare summer evening you may chance to see a peregrine falcon soaring high in the warm blue skies above. And looking down, what does he see but hundreds of stone forts built in antiquity, many ancient monuments from the stone and bronze ages, and a wealth of Christian history.
